Liberal Studies, Adult Baccalaureate Program

Elementary School Teaching emphasis:

a major which prepares students for entry into a teaching credential program for grades K-8.

Liberal Arts emphasis:

a major which offers students the intellectual challenge of a degree which encompasses the broad spectrum of the liberal arts.

ABOUT THE MAJOR

The Liberal Studies major is the broadest major in the University curriculum. Students take a wide range of courses in all academic divisions of the college. The Liberal Studies major includes foundation and advanced courses in the traditional liberal arts fields: humanities, fine and performing arts, mathematics and sciences, and the social sciences. In addition, students choose a twelve-unit Concentration for depth in one field of study.

Some possible areas of Concentration are: Humanities in World Cultures, Language Arts, Literature, Social Science, Teaching English as a Second Language, or Values Inquiry and Moral Reasoning. Students may also choose to design their own disciplinary or multi-disciplinary concentrations.

The Liberal Studies program at Holy Names offers small classes and frequent interactions with Liberal Studies advisors and professors. In their final year of study, students present an integrative portfolio of their college work and meet with advisors to assess their preparation for future work and study. Students participate in an internship and work closely with career counselors and representatives of the HNU credential program to explore career options (Students interested in teaching who are already working in an elementary school setting may have this requirement waived).

Students interested in teaching may enter the HNU credential program which will complete the teaching training required for a California Credential.

CAREER OPTIONS

Graduates interested in teaching in grades K-8 have preparation in all of the subject matter areas taught in the schools. They are prepared to begin post-graduate studies in a credential program.

The broad scope of the Liberal Studies major also prepares graduates for careers or graduate study in law, international business, management, journalism, environmental studies, and other fields where a wide knowledge of different disciplines will be important.
